#### Introduction

This past year, the Angelo Del Toro Puerto Rican/Hispanic Youth Leadership Institute (PR/HYLI) completed its 33<sup>rd</sup> year of youth development and mock assembly experiences. This year's theme was, "**Defending Our Democracy**".





Headed by Questar III BOCES (Questar), participation in the PR/HYLI consisted of 3 stages:

- Completing **30 hours** of Home Delegation Trainings,
- Attending 2.5 days of the Albany Conference Weekend, and
- Participating in countless opportunities to further learning through Community Continuation (for some delegates this includes a trip to Washington, D.C.)

This year, Questar selected Via Evaluation (VIA) as the evaluator and collaboratively created an evaluation plan to measure the project's progress towards the goals and focus areas of the grant across all program stages. This report summarizes these efforts, results, and the recommendations for future evaluation strategies.

#### **Information Gathering**

Key staff were identified for interviews to collect information about the history of the program to inform programming alignment prior to the Albany Conference weekend.

### Overall Participation

233 Students attended the Albany conference weekend,

after receiving a minimum of

hours of leadership, public speaking,

and state legislative trainings. Participants came from the

home delegations

spanning the state of New York.

174 participants provided feedback on their PR/HYLI experience (75%)

through an anonymous survey after attending one deadersh

training workshops and participating in the Mock Assembly.


\*Note: Given the small sample size of the data collected during key staff interviews, the responses cannot be shared but are incorporated into the findings and recommendations.

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### **Workshop Observations**

During the 10 student leadership training workshops, VIA observed every session for a minimum of 10 minutes. Using a tool developed to capture the sessions' alignment to the intended focused areas of the project overall and youth learning and development, evaluators summarized the workshop events and identified a main takeaway and area for improvement:

- Workshops with explicitly stated goals for the activity, presented to students with an evident connection to the skills they would develop, appeared to have more opportunities for students to build the relevant skills.
- Students may need extra support to remain engaged in the overall activity with tasks that are relevant to the skill building and development focus areas of the institute, especially when separating from the group to do more individual work.




#### Informal Student Feedback Questions

During the Albany Conference weekend, students attended a Cultural Networking Event where they had the opportunity to mingle and meet with other delegates. The posters shown below were set up to ask for informal feedback on sticky-notes as the students circulated throughout the night.

### Youth Participant Survey — Post Conference

At the end of the Albany Conference weekend, paper surveys were disseminated by PR/HLYI staff to students. The first part of the survey was intended to collect general student satisfaction with their experiences both at the conference weekend and during their Home Delegation Trainings.

**98%** of respondents said PR/HYLI was a **positive experience!** 

Overall, my experience participating in PR/HYLI was positive.


I enjoyed meeting students from other delegations at the Institute.

### Youth Participant Survey — Post Conference

The second part of the survey looked to measure students' knowledge and skill acquisition. These questions focused on youth development and learning across the grant's intended goals and focus areas: public speaking, critical thinking, and debate skills.

**98%** of respondents said PR/HYLI helped them consider other points of view



After participating in PR/HYLI, I am better able to consider other viewpoints.



The third part of the survey looked to measure the impact of PR/HYLI on student knowledge. These questions were aligned to the curriculum students followed during the Home Delegation trainings and the activities they participated in during the conference.



### Youth Participant Survey — Post Conference

The final section of the survey provided a space for students to respond to open-ended questions. Students reflected on what they liked best about PR/HYLI and what would make PR/HYLI better. Participants were also asked to share an experience where they used what they learned from PR/HYLI and how they would use their new skills in the future, along with general thoughts.

In AP Gov we needed to debate for the 1st time... and I knew how to create an argument.

At the mock trial I was able to argue and defend my position using the vision, organization, voice, and action that I learned from my workshop about freedom dreaming

while also truly listening to the opposing side. I also see myself feeling confident no matter if I am the only latina in the room.

I will use what I learned in PRHYLI to be an active leader and citizen.

I loved how fun it was to learn. PR/HYLI made me learn so many new things in such an engaging [way], which was a great experience.

I liked the ability to improve my public speaking, meet new people, and learn about our government.

It would be better if all delegates have a certain time to share their thoughts in Assembly and by that we would hear more points of view.

I have never felt more comfortable in my own skin in my entire life and it's because of this program.



### Youth Participant Survey – Post DC

From June  $4^{th} - 6^{th}$ , 21 PR/HYLI participants (3 from each delegation) traveled to Washington, D.C. Students met with congressional representatives, toured the capital, and continued to learn about government while developing their leadership and advocacy skills. Students were asked to share feedback on their experience and in the first part of the survey, they provided responses to questions related to their satisfaction.

**100%** of participants said the trip was a **positive experience** and they **learned a lot** 


I learned a lot during the meetings with NY congressional representatives.

100% of participants said their critical thinking ability improved as a result of the trip





Finally, students were provided a space to respond to open-ended questions around their likes and suggested improvements. The students were also asked to share an experience where they used what they learned from PR/HYLI during the trip, along with general thoughts.

#### **KEY** FINDINGS



#### PR/HYLI students felt a sense of belonging.

The conference weekend served as a welcoming environment for students to socialize and learn. Students shared many comments on the incomparable joy and support they felt during the weekend, many for the first time. PR/HYLI has built a space where students can feel they belong while gaining confidence practicing leadership Youth learning & development goals were met. skills, and engaging in government. Students reported overwhelmingly positive

results on their personal skill development and learning. The curriculum followed during home delegation trainings prepared students with the legislative knowledge needed to participate while the mock assembly provided an opportunity for students to practice using those skills in a Student voice can support programmatic



Using the feedback provided by students, PR/HYLI can ensure the conference activities reflect student voice and encourage participation throughout all the events. Staff, trainer, and chaperone feedback may also help identify areas

## Restructure & condense the student feedback survey

to be delivered after home delegation trainings and the conference weekend. This will ensure more specifically aligned feedback to the recent experiences. The surveys should contain questions tailored to


the grant's identified goals while also collecting relevant information to the completed activities.



# Create a networking & internship contact repository

to support students' newly found confidence and continued leadership skill development. Students were excited to bring what they learned at PR/HYLI back to their communities but did not offer many concrete examples on how, when, and where they would do so. This repository will help them take the next step.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS





#### Share out feedback information and data

to ensure a reciprocal and trusting relationship is sustained. Building trust with youth is especially important in a program centered around students' experience. PR/HYLI has created a welcoming environment, instilling a sense of belonging in many participants that can continue to grow as they see the data and publicly shared reports.



Create Year 2 evaluation plan
to establish a timeline for project activities and guide the work and expectations moving forward.

#### **NEXT STEPS**



#### **Follow up on Year 1 recommendations**

to ensure edits are made to student surveys to be delivered after Home Delegation trainings and the conference weekend.



#### **Plan for Home Delegation site visits**

to observe curriculum implementation and fidelity. Visiting various sites will also ensure consistency in learning and achieving the desired goals for students.



#### **Consider interactive student feedback**

at the next Albany Conference weekend. Using a creative and interactive evaluation technique, like Photo Voice, will help engage students in the evaluation process.
