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## Executive Summary

The 2024-2025 PR/HYLI Annual Report outlines the progress and achievements of the Angelo Del Toro Puerto Rican/Hispanic Youth Leadership Institute (PR/HYLI) under the leadership of Questar III BOCES. For over seventeen years, Questar has spearheaded the implementation of PR/HYLI, aimed at fostering leadership skills, public speaking abilities, and in-depth understandings of the legislative process among high school students across New York State. The Institute also seeks to facilitate interaction between students and elected officials, educators, and business leaders and to create opportunities for dialogue, learning, and potential collaboration.

PR/HYLI is a multi-stage program that includes Home Delegation Trainings, a three-day Leadership Institute in Albany, and Community Continuation activities.

### Home Delegation Trainings

Students participate in a minimum of 30 hours of workshops, focusing on leadership, teambuilding, public speaking, and understanding the state legislative process. These trainings prepare students for the subsequent stages of the program.

### Leadership Institute

Held in Albany, this weekend brings together students from all seven regional delegations for youth development workshops and a Legislative Mock Assembly Session in the New York State Assembly chamber. This session allows students to demonstrate their facility in parliamentary procedures and debate skills.

### Community Continuation

After the Leadership Institute, students return to their communities to continue applying the skills they have developed. Selected outstanding delegates also have opportunities to visit Washington D.C. and Puerto Rico for additional developmental experiences and more exposure to advocacy.

## Key Insights



### Students show significant gains in confidence and skills.

Students reported notable increases in confidence, particularly in public speaking and understanding parliamentary procedures. This was particularly evident in the Leadership Institute survey. These gains are important because they empower students to step into leadership roles, advocate for their communities, and engage in civic spaces with purpose and clarity.



### **Participants express high satisfaction and offer positive feedback.**

Both students and delegation staff provided overwhelmingly positive feedback about the program's impact on their knowledge and skills. Satisfaction levels were exceptionally high, with 99% of students reporting a positive experience and 94% of students saying they are likely or extremely likely to recommend PR/HYLI to others.



### **Virtual caucus and specialty roles meetings were effective.**

Observations showed that these pre-Institute sessions provide valuable scaffolding to help prepare students for the Mock Assembly. The preparedness and confidence of student and staff facilitators are important factors in ensuring that these sessions are engaging and effectively build students' readiness to lead and participate meaningfully in legislative simulations.



### **Experiential learning trips are highly valued and support program goals.**

Students reported that the trips to Puerto Rico and Washington, D.C. deepened their understanding of government and advocacy. Students reported that PR/HYLI training helped them ask better questions, understand legislative processes, and engage confidently with elected officials.



### **Room for growth in training staff on specialty roles.**

While both students and staff found value in extended training on parliamentary procedures—particularly the opportunity to rehearse roles and scripts before the Mock Assembly—half of the staff expressed uncertainty about their preparedness after attending the virtual Train the Trainer session. This highlights the need for ongoing training to ensure all facilitators feel confident in guiding students through specialized legislative roles.

## **Recommendations**



### **Provide a Specialty Roles FAQ for delegates.**

Create and disseminate a FAQ that includes the assigned duties of each specialty role, not just the parliamentary procedures script. This will help ensure student leaders feel prepared and confident to facilitate the Caucus meetings and the Mock Assembly.



### **Invite each delegation to share a supplemental activity at the Train the Trainer workshop.**

Given that many delegation staff are long-term PR/HYLI members familiar with the training manual and supplemental materials, consider dedicating time during the Train the Trainer workshops for them to share successful activities or promising practices with other delegations. This will help ensure all students benefit from innovative and engaging civic engagement opportunities.



### **Continue with specialized parliamentary procedures training for students and staff.**

Staff and students emphasized the value of the extra time spent training on parliamentary procedures and getting to practice their roles and scripts prior to the Mock Assembly. Some staff who attended the virtual Train the Trainer session noted they did not feel particularly knowledgeable about parliamentary procedures and the Mock Legislative Assembly and felt only somewhat prepared to explain specialty roles to their delegates. This highlights a potential need for more comprehensive onboarding resources for staff.



### **Encourage PR/HYLI staff to use flexible classroom spaces that support collaboration and student voice.**

Rooms with movable furniture allow for flexible classroom setups that may better align with session goals than lecture-style spaces. Encourage home delegations to secure classroom space where tables and chairs can be organized in various ways to support teamwork and prioritize interaction among students.



### **Consider creating additional opportunities for networking and relationship-building across delegations.**

In previous years, students' open-ended survey responses highlighted the Leadership Institute and trips to Puerto Rico and Washington, D.C. as powerful networking experiences that fostered community and shared purpose. While this theme was less prominent in this year's findings, many students expressed a desire to connect with youth leaders from other delegations. Creating additional structured and organic opportunities for cross-delegation networking would honor youth voice, respond to participant priorities, and help cultivate the collective power and agency central to the Institute's mission of developing informed, active community leaders.



## Introduction

Over the past seventeen years, Questar III BOCES (Questar) has headed the programming and implementation of the Angelo Del Toro Puerto Rican/Hispanic Youth Leadership Institute (PR/HYLI). The Institute invites high school students from across the state of New York to apply to participate in their home delegations as preparation for the main conference. Across New York State, there are seven regional delegations:

- Capital District
- Hudson Valley
- Long Island
- Monroe
- New York City
- Syracuse
- Western New York

Under the direction of Questar III BOCES District Superintendent Dr. Gladys I. Cruz and in collaboration with other state agency and assembly task force partners, the Institute has created a curriculum designed to promote leadership skills, develop public speaking abilities, and foster in-depth knowledge of the state legislative process among students. This year, the overarching learning theme for the Institute was “Perseverance and the Power of Democracy.” Students participate in ongoing Home Delegation Trainings hosted at each regional site, a three-day Leadership Institute in Albany, and Community Continuation activities completed at home sites after the Leadership Institute.

Annually, virtual trainings are held for the students attending the Leadership Institute to prepare them for Caucus Meetings and specialty roles during the Mock Assembly. In-person Train the Trainer workshops are offered to all PR/HYLI staff to prepare them to utilize the PR/HYLI training manual and incorporate each year’s theme. A virtual Train the Trainer workshop is held to better support PR/HYLI staff in guiding students in the parliamentary procedures required during the Mock Assembly.

### Home Delegation Trainings

Accepted students participate in a minimum of 30 hours of development workshops, guided by delegation trainers following the statewide curriculum. The curriculum is broken into five sessions with modules focusing on developing leadership and teambuilding skills, building public speaking and communication abilities, and learning about the state legislative process. Students learn about parliamentary procedures, proper debating decorum, and the process of how a bill becomes a law during their home delegation training. Each year, specific bills relevant to the Hispanic community and the annual theme are selected by the PR/HYLI state project team. Students research the bills, develop arguments for or against each bill, and engage in debate.

## Leadership Institute

Students from all seven delegations come together for a weekend of youth development workshops and a Legislative Mock Assembly Session. During the first two days of the conference weekend, participants attend workshops designed to build upon the skills they learned during home delegation training. They also have opportunities to network with students from across the state. The weekend culminates in a Legislative Mock Assembly session, conducted in the New York State Assembly chamber, where students debate the proposed bills.

## Community Continuation

After students return to their local communities with the knowledge and skills developed throughout their training and used during the Leadership Institute, they continue practicing these skills throughout their education and service careers. Many students find ways to actively engage with their community through advocacy work, volunteer opportunities, and new jobs.

Selected outstanding student delegates are invited to Washington, D.C., and some to Puerto Rico, to experience additional development opportunities and learn about the political process at the federal level and in a U.S. territory. Outstanding student delegates also visit historical landmarks and meet congressmembers to advocate for issues of importance to them.



## Evaluation Approach & Methodology

This report serves to summarize the knowledge and experiences gained by students through their participation in the Home Delegation Training, Leadership Institute, and various educational trips. It also reports to some extent on the experiences of PR/HYLI delegation staff. This report is intended to inform PR/HYLI program staff about program implementation and progress toward grant goals.

Questar selected Via Evaluation (VIA) as the program evaluator for the newest PR/HYLI grant period. The assigned evaluator for this program, Claire Fontaine Ph.D., had primary responsibility for the evaluation, and was supported by research associates in the completion of the evaluation activities and analysis.

VIA takes a utilization-focused approach to evaluation. This approach emphasizes the involvement of stakeholders in the project development and evaluation process to enhance the usefulness of evaluation. To this end, VIA collaborated with the PR/HYLI state project team to:

- review existing evaluation plans and specified program goals;
- refine data collection and evaluation activities;
- create surveys, enter survey data, analyze survey data, and report on results;
- conduct observations;
- compile and analyze program data as soon as available; and
- generally advise program staff about evaluation, collecting high-quality data, and project outcomes.

The evaluation plan was created at the beginning of the project to detail the data to be collected, by date needed and person responsible. It was created to minimize the administrative burden on program implementers while ensuring sufficient data were collected.

A summary of the evaluation plan for the third year of the project is provided in the table below.

# Evaluation Findings

This section includes summaries of each evaluation activity, data collected, and associated findings.

## Home Delegation Trainings

From September 2024 through April 2025, the seven PR/HYLI delegations each facilitated a minimum of four training sessions.

Depending on the home delegation, these sessions were offered during the school day, after school, or on Saturday mornings. Some sessions were held in-person while others were virtual. The training session curriculum includes 14 different modules. The topics included leadership, public speaking, democracy, how a bill becomes a law, parliamentary procedures and decorum, analysis and study of bills, advocacy, writing a scholarship essay, and debating with political party affiliation.

### Data Collected

VIA staff coordinated with the PR/HYLI state project team to observe in-person one training session at two different home delegations (Hudson Valley and Long Island) as they were only observed virtually last year. Home delegation trainers were notified in advance. VIA staff observed a variety of modules and exercises and the site visits lasted for two hours. Student attendance varied by delegation, ranging from approximately 63 students to 83 students. The Site Visit Observation tool is included in Appendix A.

A digital survey was distributed to students via their home delegation in May, after the conclusion of all delegation sessions and the Institute. The survey looked to provide an understanding of the program’s impact on student learning, and students’ knowledge and skill building throughout PR/HYLI, and student satisfaction with program activities for the students who did not attend the Albany Institute weekend. However, the Home Delegation survey only had three student

responses. This data set is excluded from this report due to its low response rate, which limits the reliability and representativeness of findings.



## Findings

Overall, most students were actively engaged in delegation training activities. Both delegations focused on accessibility and language differentiation practices that effectively engaged both English- and Spanish-dominant students. Content was presented in both Spanish and English for students through a variety of means, including translated PowerPoint slides, live translation of the speakers on the projected display, and verbal instructions delivered in both languages.

Both observed delegation trainings included discussion of scholarship essays, preparation for the upcoming Albany Institute Mock Assembly, and a speech and networking opportunity with a guest speaker. The Hudson Valley Delegation's speaker was Assemblywoman Karines Reyes who spoke on two of this year's bills to be debated at the Mock Assembly. The Long Island Delegation's guest speaker

was the Superintendent of Easter Suffolk BOCES, Jasmin Varela, who spoke about this year's theme, "Perseverance and the Power of Democracy."

Both delegation sessions allowed students to practice their public speaking skills through asking questions in front of the group and in their debate preparation activities. There was a range of abilities and confidence displayed by the students within each delegation.

The two delegation trainings observed varied in both the types of spaces used and how those spaces supported the training format. The Hudson Valley Delegation held its session in a modern, bright, and spacious university lecture hall at SUNY Purchase's Durst Liberal Arts building. While the environment was visually appealing, the fixed seating arrangement naturally lent itself to a more lecture-style setup. As a result, the observed portion of the session emphasized presentations by adult speakers, with limited opportunities for student collaboration or peer interaction.

The Long Island Delegation training was held in the Western Suffolk BOCES administrative offices. The designated room was large and included a stage and many tables and chairs that could be rearranged at will. For the session observed, the tables were arranged to roughly mirror the organization of the New York State Assembly chamber. Democrats sat on one side, and Republicans on the other. Each student's place was marked by the name of the lawmaker that student was meant to be representing.

The Long Island Delegation training was also notable for the way in which it effectively engaged students as active learners and scaffolded students' analysis of bills and construction of arguments for and against bills.

The first activity observed was a warm-up activity that operationalized the theme of "Perseverance and the Power of Democracy." The activity invited students to strongly agree, agree, disagree, or strongly disagree with each of three statements that were projected overhead: 1) Social media is a threat to the democratic process; 2) Every law should be approved by a direct vote of the people, not a representative; and 3) Hard work is enough to achieve your goals, no matter the obstacles.

Students were asked to physically move to one of four corners of the room depending on which position of agreement/disagreement they are assuming vis a vis the statement. On-topic conversation was observed among students, mixed with laughter and general enjoyment. Students discussed their arguments as a group, and then several representatives of each group shared their opinions with the larger group using the microphone. Some presented in English, others in Spanish. The activity seemed to effectively warm students up to the debate frame of mind, had them actively engaged, and set the tone for a day of active engagement. PR/HYLI staff circulated among students and gave them feedback and encouragement.

Later in the day, there was a "Powerful Arguments Review" activity, in which students were guided through a process of scaffolding their arguments for Caucus and Mock Assembly. Students were asked to select one of their previously developed "powerful arguments" from the Canvas LMS platform, to review the components of a powerful argument, to translate these arguments to the index cards located in their folders, and then to share these arguments with each other. Students appeared to understand the instructions, completed the necessary preparatory activities, and completed the task in the time allotted.

The training also featured preparation in parliamentary procedures by a PR/HYLI alumna, who effectively modeled standards of decorum. The alumna presided with gravitas and kindness, and the use of a near-peer recent program graduate seemed to resonate with students.

Overall, the Long Island delegation stood out for the way it cultivated learner engagement and provided scaffolded support to strengthen argument development and public speaking confidence.

### Specialty Roles & Caucus Meetings

In February, two Specialty Roles meetings and four Caucus meetings were held to prepare students for the Mock Assembly at the Albany Leadership Institute. Students assigned a specialty role were required to attend one Specialty Roles meeting, while any student wishing to speak

during the Mock Assembly had to attend a Caucus meeting. This year marked the first time PR/HYLI hosted virtual Caucus meetings in advance of the Institute, aiming to better coordinate delegation responsibilities and provide students with more time to practice.

All meetings were held virtually, via Zoom, and during the school week in the evening. The Specialty Roles Meeting agenda included reviewing the expectations for the delegates and those with specialty roles during the Mock Assembly, the Albany Leadership Institute schedule, the format of the Mock Assembly, the format of Caucuses, and the Calendar of Bills. The agenda for the Caucus Meeting of either party included summarizing the purpose of the Caucus, reviewing how to sign-up to speak during the Mock Assembly, Q&A, introductions of the delegates in specialty roles (i.e. Speaker of the Assembly, Assistant Speakers, Majority/Minority Leaders, and Majority/Minority Whip), and breakout rooms to practice parliamentary procedures and presenting prepared arguments for the different bills.

The meetings were led by the PR/HYLI state project team and select delegation staff experienced in parliamentary procedures from the Monroe Delegation. The delegates with Specialty Roles facilitated the breakout rooms' practice time.

### Data Collected

VIA staff coordinated with the PR/HYLI state project team to observe virtually one of the two Specialty Roles meetings and one of the four Caucus meetings. VIA staff observed the entirety of each meeting, lasting from 1.5-2 hours. Student attendance varied, with 36 in attendance for the Specialty Roles meeting and 41 for the Republican Caucus meeting. The completed observation summaries are included in Appendix B.

### Findings

Both observed meetings provided an opportunity for students to ask many detailed questions on the logistics of the Caucus Meetings and Mock Assembly during the Albany Leadership Institute compared to the more common questions asked at the Home Delegation settings focused on the parliamentary script during the Mock Assembly. It was clear from both meetings that the students had sufficient scaffolding supports from their Home Delegation trainings to prepare them, specifically their knowledge of the parliamentary procedures script and their prepared arguments for the bills.

The impact of both meetings appeared to be significantly linked to the expertise and knowledge of the staff facilitating it. By providing transparency at the beginning of the Caucus meeting that students would be selected to speak during the Mock Assembly based on their prepared arguments and debate skills used during the meeting, the PR/HYLI project team encouraged a high level of student engagement and focus.

The success of the Caucus meeting breakout rooms hinged on the confidence and competence of the student leaders in the duties of their specialty role and the structures of the Caucus and Mock Assembly and the prior preparation of arguments by the other student participants.

## Staff Professional Development & Training Manual Interview

In the Fall of 2024, three Train the Trainer workshops were held for PR/HYLI staff.

Part One focused on strategies to incorporate this year's theme into the curriculum, differentiate and scaffold modifications for multilingual learners, and meet both English-dominant and Spanish-dominant student needs. Staff had two options to attend: one

workshop was held in Albany on October 30, 2024, and another in New York City on November 16, 2024. Elaine Porcher, who has facilitated these workshops annually for PR/HYLI for at least five years, returned as the guest facilitator for both sessions.

Part Two focused on parliamentary procedures and was held via Zoom on October 31, 2024. Anthony Plonczynski, a long-time PR/HYLI staff member, facilitated this session. Some participants attended both the Parliamentary Procedures training as well as one of the standard Train the Trainer workshops.

In addition to these workshops, delegation staff are provided with the PR/HYLI training manual at the beginning of the school year. The manual is updated annually with the new theme and any needed revisions or additional resources. The manual and its 13 modules serve as a guide and resource for delegation staff as they plan and deliver their regional delegation workshops held prior to the Albany Leadership Institute. While each delegation's implementation of the resources and sample lesson plans may differ, the manual provides a common set of objectives required to prepare students for the Institute. This year's manual was reorganized to embed the resources within each respective module, as opposed to previous years where they were all listed separately at the end of the manual as an appendix.

In the Spring, VIA staff coordinated with the PR/HYLI state project team to recruit a staff volunteer from each delegation to participate in a focus group to discuss the PR/HYLI training manual, specifically how they use it, any gaps and areas for enhancement and any

suggestions for additional resources or lessons that could support the manual. Only one delegation, Hudson Valley, responded to the invitation so an interview on this topic was conducted instead. The results are not shared in this report but will be incorporated into next year's report in hopes that additional delegations will participate early next year.

### Data Collected

VIA staff collaborated with the PR/HYLI state project team to observe one of the in-person Train the Trainer sessions, held in New York City. The session included 11 delegation staff members: eight from New York City, two from Monroe, and one from Western New York. Of these, ten were returning PR/HYLI staff and one was new. In addition to the facilitator, the PR/HYLI project director attended the full session, and the Questar III BOCES district superintendent joined for part of the training. VIA staff observed the entire six-hour session.

A survey was distributed to all staff who participated in the Train the Trainer workshops. Paper surveys were handed out at the end of each in-person session, while a digital version was shared following the virtual workshop. VIA staff collected the paper surveys from the New York City session for data entry, and those from the Albany session were scanned and emailed to VIA. Any responses submitted in Spanish were translated into English for analysis.

The survey was designed to gather insights on how staff plan to apply workshop techniques and examples in their delegation training, assess their readiness to implement the PR/HYLI curriculum and this year's theme, and collect general feedback on the workshops. It was divided into two sections: one for in-person workshops and one for the virtual session. The full survey report, including data visualizations and all comments, is provided in Appendix C.

### Findings

The in-person workshop did not follow the full agenda but focused primarily on practicing interactive learning activities that complement the training manual. Participants also engaged in networking and shared best practices. Since many attendees were already familiar with PR/HYLI, they recognized several of the activities and enthusiastically contributed resources and ideas to enhance student learning during group discussions.

**“Always appreciate being able to access and put activities into practice”**

At the end of each workshop, participants were asked to provide feedback and describe how they plan to apply the training in their teaching this year. A total of 32 responses were

collected: 22 for Part One (10 from the New York City workshop and 12 from the Albany workshop) and 10 for Part Two.

**“Really enjoy[ed] calibrating and sharing different ideas for running our sessions”**

Feedback on the in-person workshops was overwhelmingly positive regarding the usefulness of practical examples, techniques, and alignment with the curriculum. However, responses were less favorable when asked how well the workshops aligned with this year’s theme and

how prepared participants felt to discuss Astronaut José M. Hernández with students. Overall, most respondents agreed or strongly agreed that the workshop was a good use of their time and met their expectations.

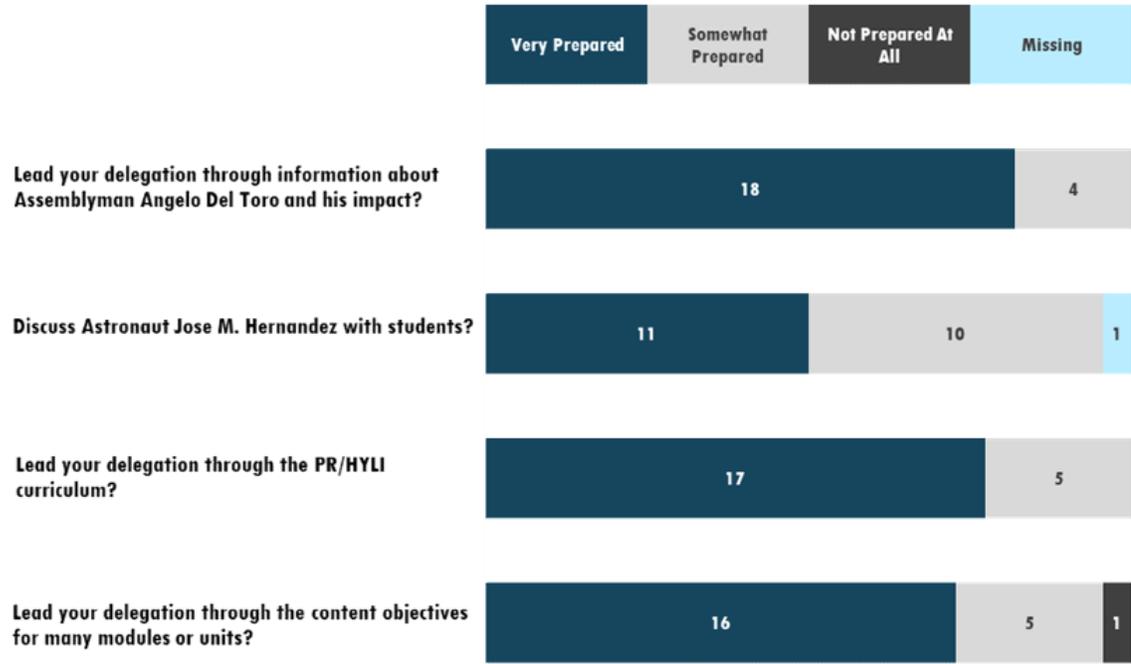

The feedback on the virtual training was less positive, with some respondents reporting they did not feel particularly knowledgeable about parliamentary procedures and the Mock Legislative Assembly and only somewhat prepared to explain specialty roles to their delegates. However, they all reported the workshop met their expectations.

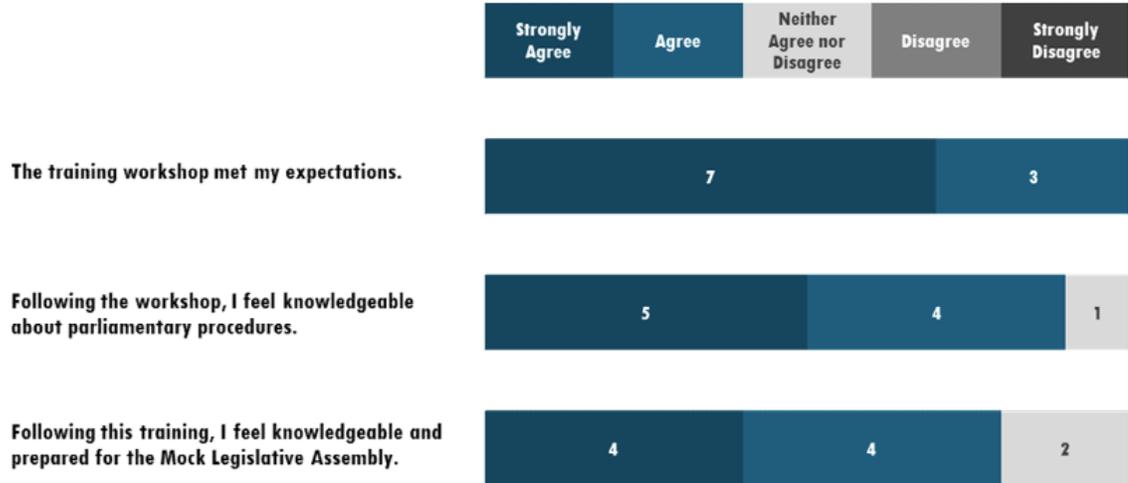
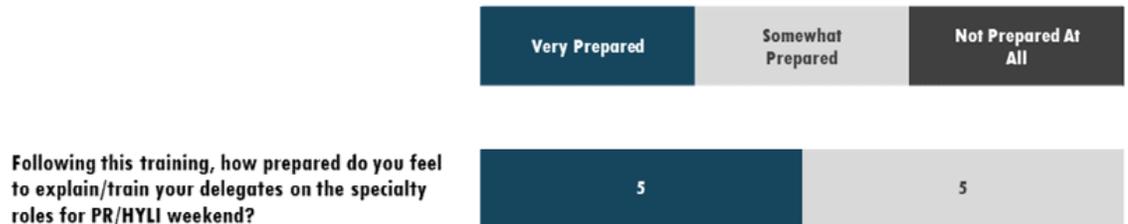

**Student Trips**

In November 2024, seven students, one from each delegation, traveled to Puerto Rico with PR/HYLI staff to attend the SOMOS, Inc. Conference and deepen their understanding of government, leadership, and advocacy.

In May 2025, 12 students, two from each delegation, joined PR/HYLI staff on a trip to Washington, D.C., where they met with New York State representatives and continued their learning in government, leadership, and advocacy.

### Data Collected

Separate surveys were administered at the end of each trip, asking students to reflect on their experiences and how participation in PR/HYLI influenced those experiences. All completed surveys were collected by PR/HYLI staff, and paper surveys were scanned and emailed to VIA for data entry. Any responses submitted in Spanish were translated into English for analysis. The full survey reports, including data visualizations and complete student comments, are included in Appendix C.

### Findings

All seven PR/HYLI students who traveled to Puerto Rico completed the post-trip survey. Feedback on knowledge and skill development was overwhelmingly positive, with all students selecting “strongly agree” or “agree” for every related question. Students also reported increased understanding of leadership roles, government functions, and the differences between the governments of Puerto Rico and New York State.

All 12 PR/HYLI participants who traveled to Washington, D.C. also completed the post-trip survey. Again, feedback on knowledge and skill development was overwhelmingly positive, with every respondent selecting “strongly agree” or “agree” for all questions. While students identified different aspects of the trip as most impactful, common highlights included meeting with elected officials and learning about the Capitol’s history from their tour guide. Participants also noted that PR/HYLI training sessions enhanced their understanding of legislative processes and improved their ability to communicate clearly, confidently, and ask informed questions.

## Albany Leadership Institute

In March 2025, 252 student delegates from all seven PR/HYLI delegations traveled to Albany for a three-day Leadership Institute. During the event, they deepened their understanding of government, leadership, and advocacy, and participated in a Mock Assembly where they debated three different bills.

### **Data Collected**

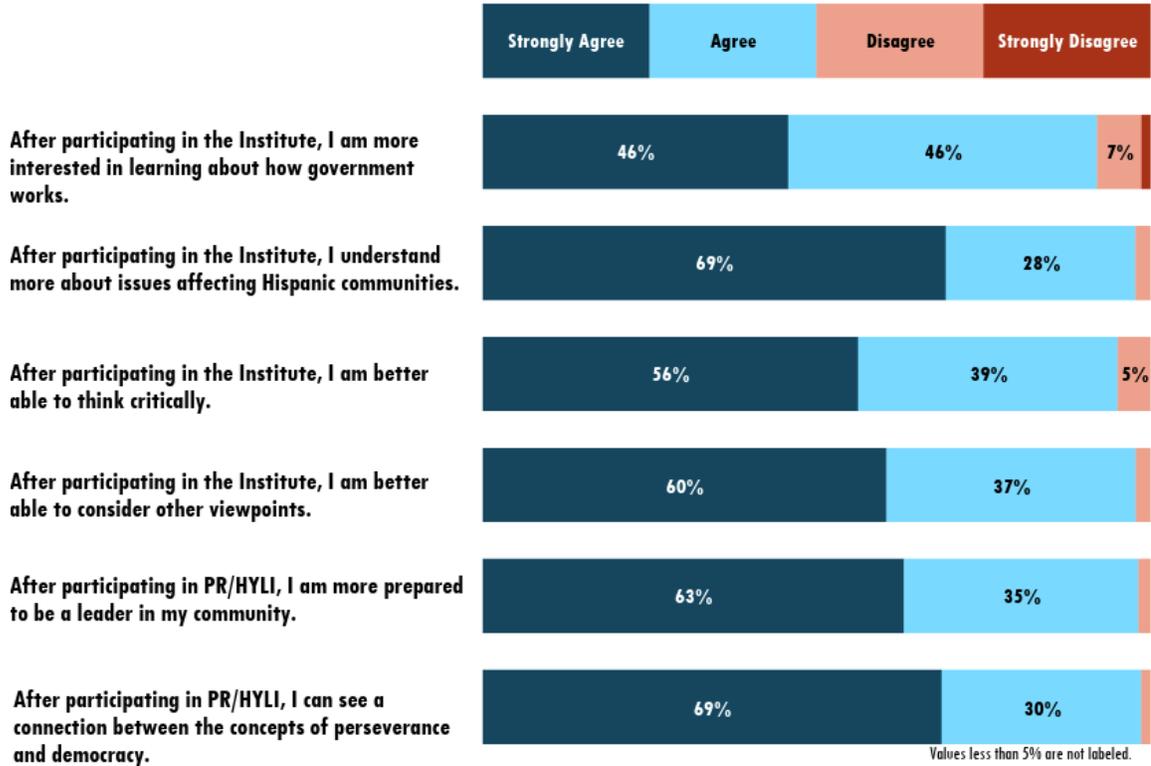
At the end of the Leadership Institute, student surveys were distributed, collected by PR/HYLI staff, and mailed to VIA for data entry. Responses submitted in Spanish were translated into English for analysis. The final survey report, including data visualizations and full participant comments, is provided in Appendix E.

### **Findings**

At the conclusion of the Leadership Institute, students completed a feedback survey about their experience. A total of 225 students responded, resulting in an 89% response rate. Survey results on knowledge and skill development were overwhelmingly positive—92% or more of students selected “strongly agree” or “agree” for every question, as shown in Figure 5 on the following page.

Students reported the greatest increase in knowledge in the area of parliamentary procedures. Before participating in PR/HYLI, 68% indicated they knew little or nothing about the topic. After the program, that number dropped to just 10%, with 90% reporting they now knew some or a lot.

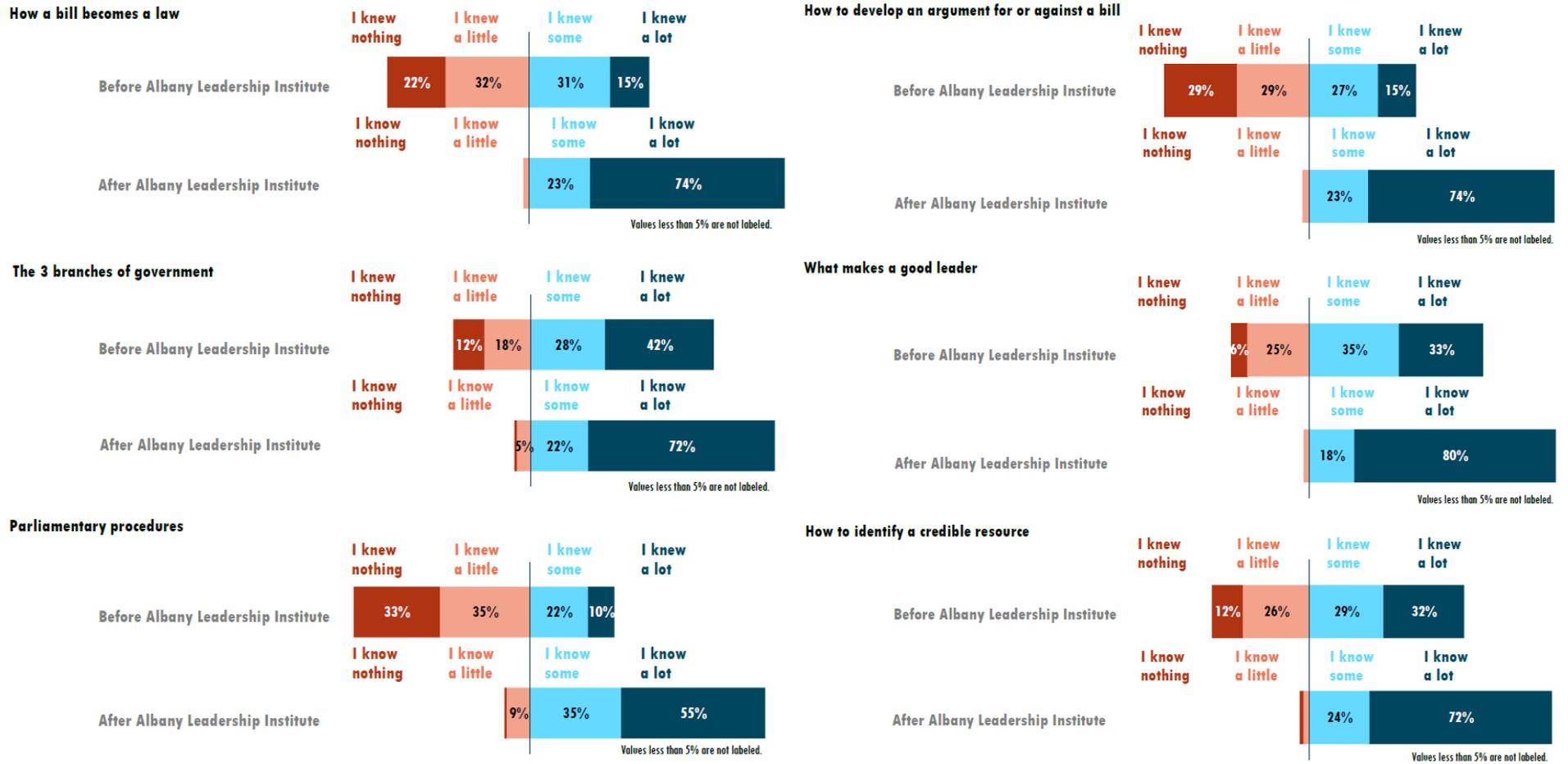
Other areas showing significant growth included developing arguments for or against a bill and understanding how a bill becomes a law, as illustrated in Figure 6 on the following page.

Among all knowledge areas assessed before and after PR/HYLI, the highest post-program knowledge was reported in understanding what makes a good leader—98% of students said they knew some or a lot about this topic. The smallest change was seen in knowledge of the three branches of government, where 70% of students already reported some or extensive knowledge before the program.

Overall, more than half of students initially reported limited knowledge in three of the six domains. After the Institute, 90% or more reported moderate to strong knowledge across all areas.

Students reported the greatest increase in confidence in public speaking. Before PR/HYLI, 52% said they felt not at all or only a little confident in this area. After the program, that number dropped to just 10%, with 90% of students reporting they felt somewhat or very confident (see Figure 7 below). The smallest change in confidence was related to interacting with adults—an area where 73% of students already felt somewhat or very confident before attending PR/HYLI.

**“I learned a lot of skills I have used during the Institute, like how to communicate better, do searches, speak in public.”**

Overall, more than half of the students reported feeling somewhat or very confident in 6 out of 7 skill areas before the program. After the Institute, 90% or more of students expressed confidence across all domains (see Figure 7 below and Figure 8 on the following page).

**Student confidence in public speaking, debate skills, and leadership all increased following participation in PR/HYLI.**

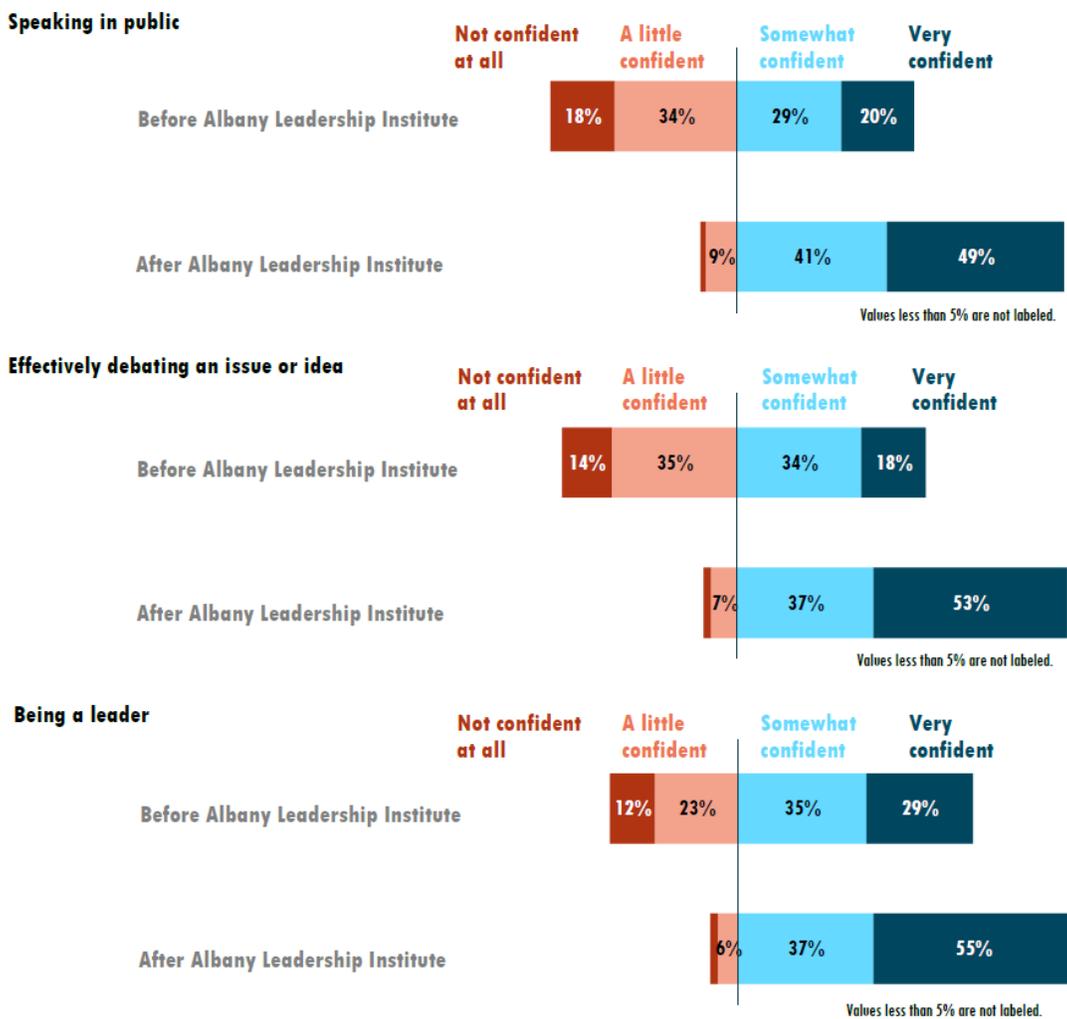
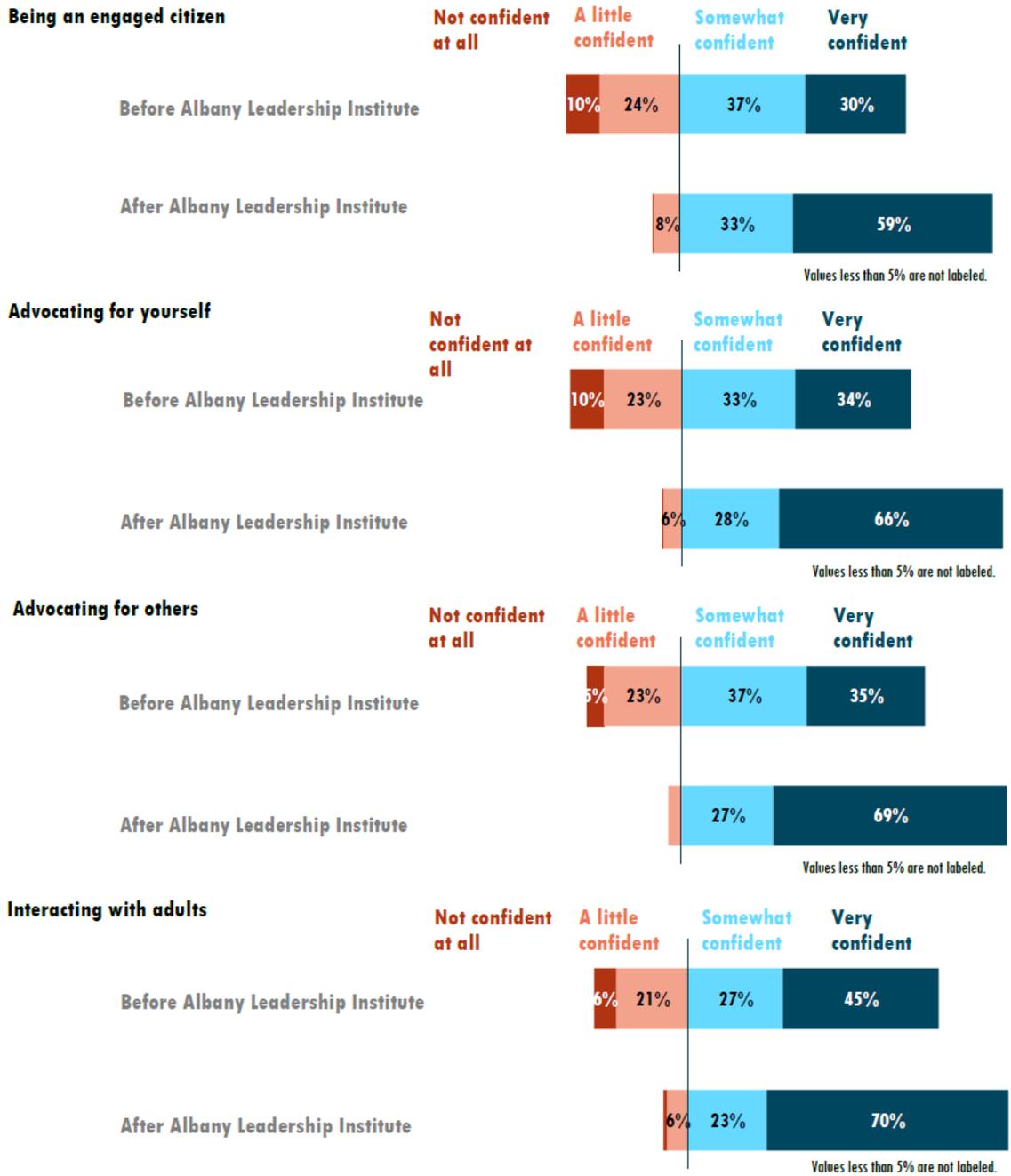

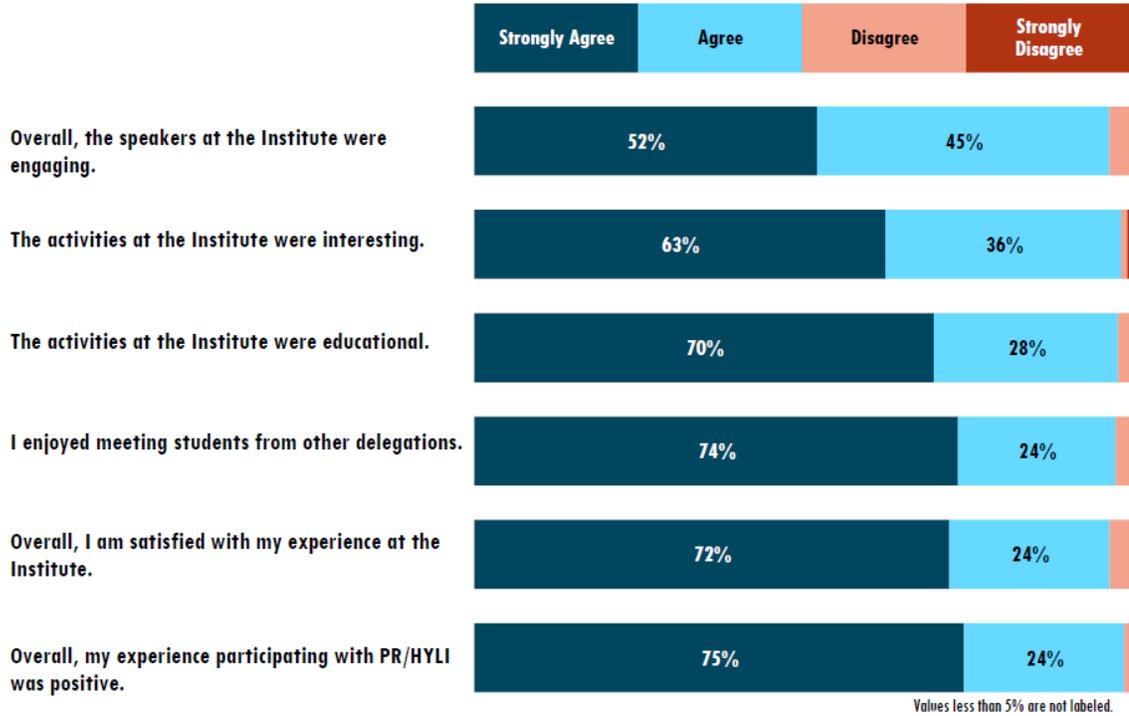
**Student confidence in citizenship, advocacy, and adult interactions all increased after they participated in PR/HYLI.**



Student feedback on their overall satisfaction with the Institute was overwhelmingly positive. For every satisfaction-related question, at least 96% of students selected “strongly agree” or “agree.” Additionally, more than half of the responses for each question fell into the highest agreement category. (See Figure 9 on the following page.)

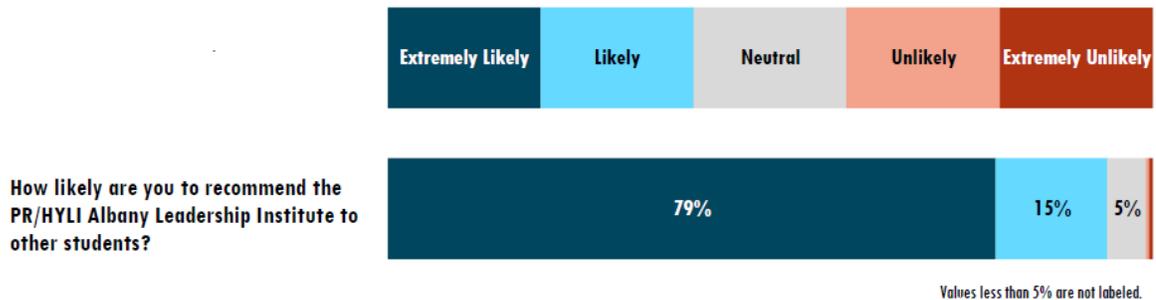
**99% of students had a positive experience participating in PR/HYLI and found the Institute activities interesting.**



When asked if they would recommend the Institute to other students, 94% said that they were likely or extremely likely to do so, as shown in Figure 10 below.

When asked what they learned throughout the year in their PR/HYLI delegation that influenced their performance at the Institute, students commonly mentioned gaining confidence, stepping outside their comfort zones, and building knowledge and skills. Their responses aligned closely with PR/HYLI’s core goals and focus areas, including public

speaking, constructing effective arguments, leadership, self- and peer-advocacy, and understanding parliamentary procedures.

When asked about their future plans, 72% of seniors planning to attend college indicated they would be first-generation college students.

Students were also invited to suggest additional content for the Institute. Common themes included a desire for more in-depth training on parliamentary procedures and roles, increased time for networking with other delegates, and a wider variety of workshops, particularly those focused on leadership development.

There was also substantial feedback on the topics of bills that were debated. Many students shared a personal connection to at least one of this year's bills.

**“This program helped me to be more confident and speak up more. I would like other people to experience this and open up to new activities.”**

**“Learning about the legislative process is so important especially during times like this. The community is so friendly, energetic, wise.”**

## Conclusions & Recommendations

As VIA continues to work with Questar for the two remaining years of the grant, we will continue to refine our strategies for data collection and outcome-focused evaluation with a focus on longitudinal outcomes. The precise approaches will be collaboratively defined with Questar during Summer 2025 to ensure alignment with evolving program goals and stakeholder needs.

Throughout the 2024-2025 grant period, PR/HYLI has continued to make significant strides in promoting leadership and civic engagement among participating youth across New York State. The comprehensive approach, encompassing Home Delegation Trainings, the Leadership Institute, and Community Continuation activities, has demonstrated a substantial impact on students' knowledge, skills, and confidence. Additionally, the newly implemented virtual Caucus & Specialty Roles meetings contributed to delegates' preparation for the Mock Assembly at the Institute. Finally, the Train the Trainer workshops served to connect delegation leaders and equip them with strategies to use at the Home Delegation sessions.

### Key Insights



#### **Students show significant gains in confidence and skills.**

Students reported notable increases in confidence, particularly in public speaking and understanding parliamentary procedures. This was particularly evident in the Leadership Institute survey. These gains are important because they empower students to step into leadership roles, advocate for their communities, and engage in civic spaces with purpose and clarity.



#### **Participants express high satisfaction and offer positive feedback.**

Both students and delegation staff provided overwhelmingly positive feedback about the program's impact on their knowledge and skills. Satisfaction levels were exceptionally high, with 99% of students reporting a positive experience and 94% of students saying they are likely or extremely likely to recommend PR/HYLI to others.



#### **Virtual caucus and specialty roles meetings were effective.**

Observations showed that these pre-Institute sessions provide valuable scaffolding to help prepare students for the Mock Assembly.

The preparedness and confidence of student and staff facilitators are important factors in ensuring that these sessions are engaging and effectively build students' readiness to lead and participate meaningfully in legislative simulations.



### **Experiential learning trips are highly valued and support program goals.**

Students reported that the trips to Puerto Rico and Washington, D.C. deepened their understanding of government and advocacy. Students reported that PR/HYLI training helped them ask better questions, understand legislative processes, and engage confidently with elected officials.



### **Room for growth in training staff on specialty roles.**

While both students and staff found value in extended training on parliamentary procedures—particularly the opportunity to rehearse roles and scripts before the Mock Assembly—half of the staff expressed uncertainty about their preparedness after attending the virtual Train the Trainer session. This highlights the need for ongoing training to ensure all facilitators feel confident in guiding students through specialized legislative roles.

## **Recommendations**

To build on the successes of the current evaluation period and further enhance PR/HYLI, the following recommendations are proposed:



### **Provide a Specialty Roles FAQ for delegates.**

Disseminate a FAQ that includes the assigned duties of each specialty role, not just the parliamentary procedures script. This will help ensure student leaders are prepared and confident to facilitate the Caucus meetings and the Mock Assembly.



### **Invite each delegation to share a supplemental activity at the Train the Trainer workshop.**

Given that many delegation staff are long-term PR/HYLI members familiar with the training manual and supplemental materials, consider dedicating time during the Train the Trainer workshops for them to share successful activities or promising practices with other delegations. This will help ensure all students benefit from innovative and engaging civic engagement opportunities.



### **Continue with specialized parliamentary procedures and specialty roles training for students and staff.**

Staff and students emphasized the value of the extra time spent training on parliamentary procedures and getting to practice their roles and scripts prior to the Mock Assembly. Some staff who attended the virtual Train the Trainer session noted they did not feel particularly knowledgeable about parliamentary procedures and the Mock Legislative Assembly and felt only somewhat prepared to explain specialty roles to their delegates. This highlights a potential need for more comprehensive onboarding resources for staff.



### **Encourage PR/HYLI staff to use flexible classroom spaces that support collaboration and student voice.**

Rooms with movable furniture allow for flexible classroom setups that may better align with session goals than lecture-style spaces do. Encourage home delegations to secure classroom space where tables and chairs can be organized in various ways to support teamwork and prioritize interaction among students.



### **Consider creating additional opportunities for networking and relationship-building across delegations.**

In previous years, students' open-ended survey responses highlighted the Leadership Institute and trips to Puerto Rico and Washington, D.C. as powerful networking experiences that fostered community and shared purpose. While this theme was less prominent in this year's findings, many students expressed a desire to connect with youth leaders from other delegations. Creating additional structured and organic opportunities for cross-delegation networking would honor youth voice, respond to participant priorities, and help cultivate the collective power and agency central to the Institute's mission of developing informed, active community leaders.

By implementing these recommendations, PR/HYLI can continue to foster a supportive and enriching environment for youth, empowering PR/HYLI students to become informed and active leaders in their communities.

In the Fall of 2024, three Train the Trainer workshops were held for PR/HYLI staff. Part One focused on strategies to incorporate this year's theme of Perseverance and the Power of Democracy into the curriculum, differentiate and scaffold modifications for multilingual learners, and meet both English-dominant and Spanish-dominant student needs. Staff had two options to attend: one workshop was held in Albany on October 30, 2024, and another in New York City on November 16, 2024. Elaine Porcher, who has facilitated these workshops annually for PR/HYLI for at least five years, returned as the guest facilitator for both sessions. Part Two focused on parliamentary procedures and was held via Zoom on October 31, 2024. Anthony Plonczynski, a long-time PR/HYLI staff member, facilitated this session. Some participants attended both the Parliamentary Procedures training as well as one of the standard Train the Trainer workshops.

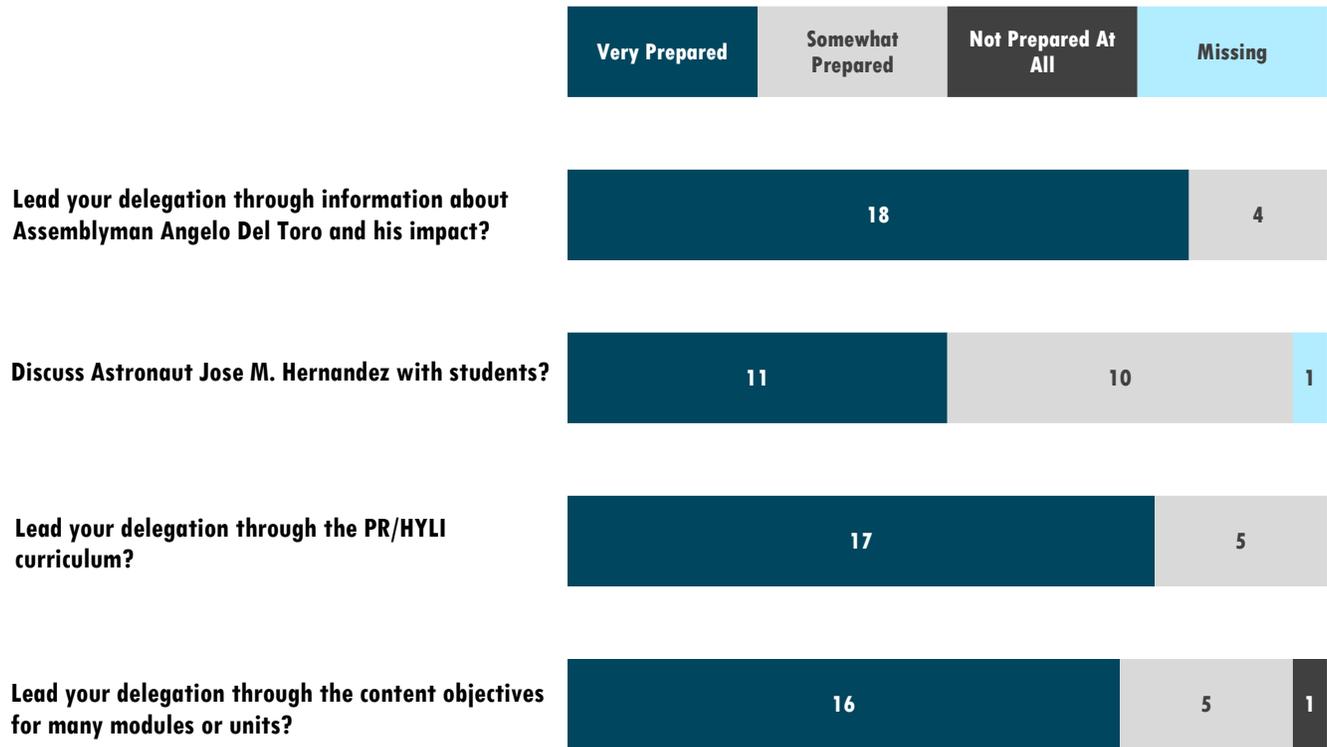

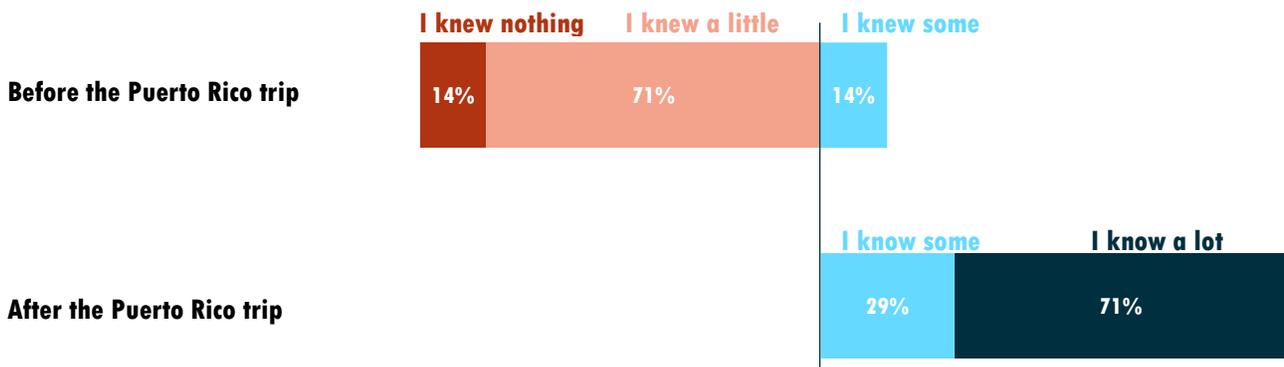

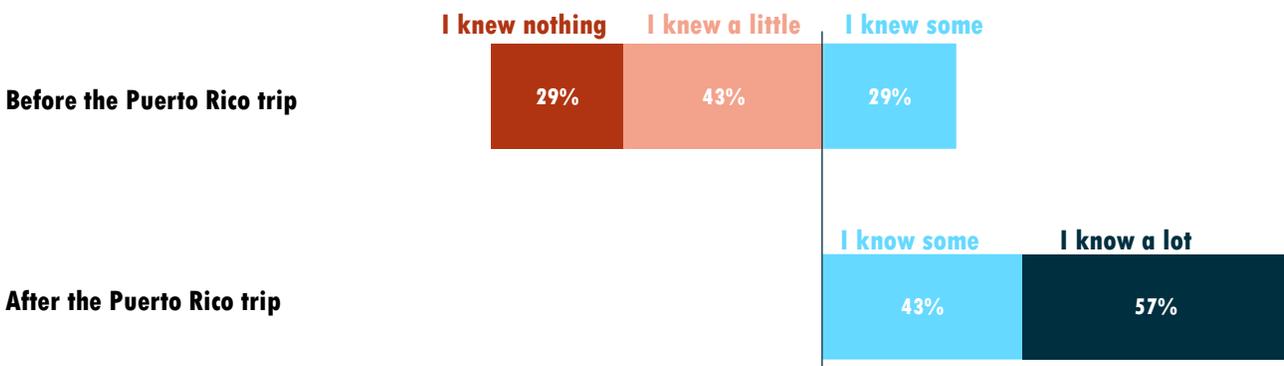
## Growth of Participant Knowledge and Legislative Understanding

How much did you know about the following topics BEFORE and AFTER the Puerto Rico trip?

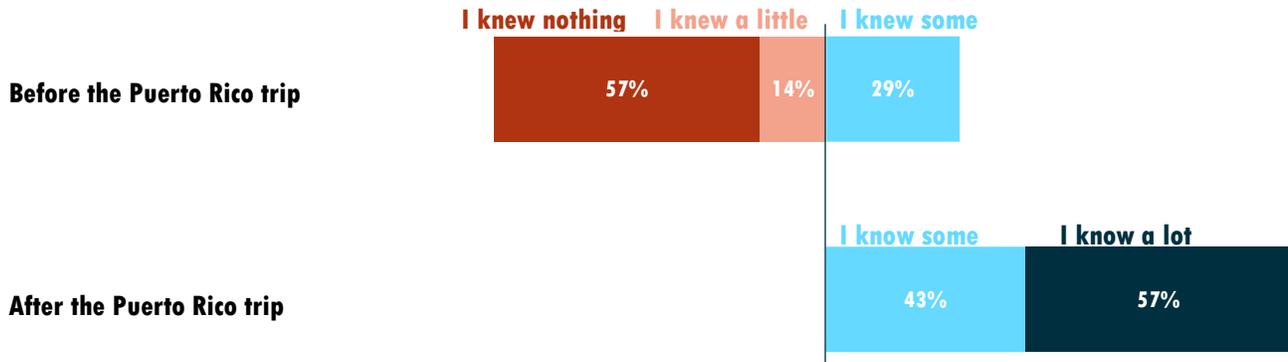

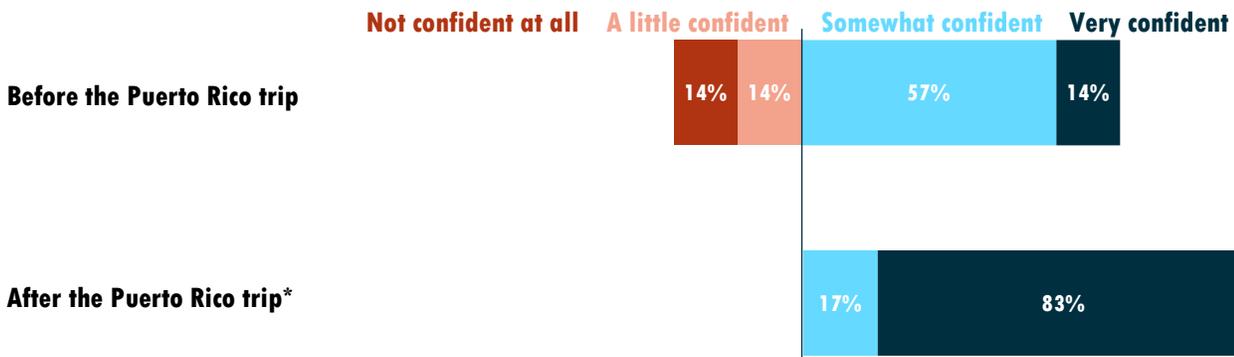

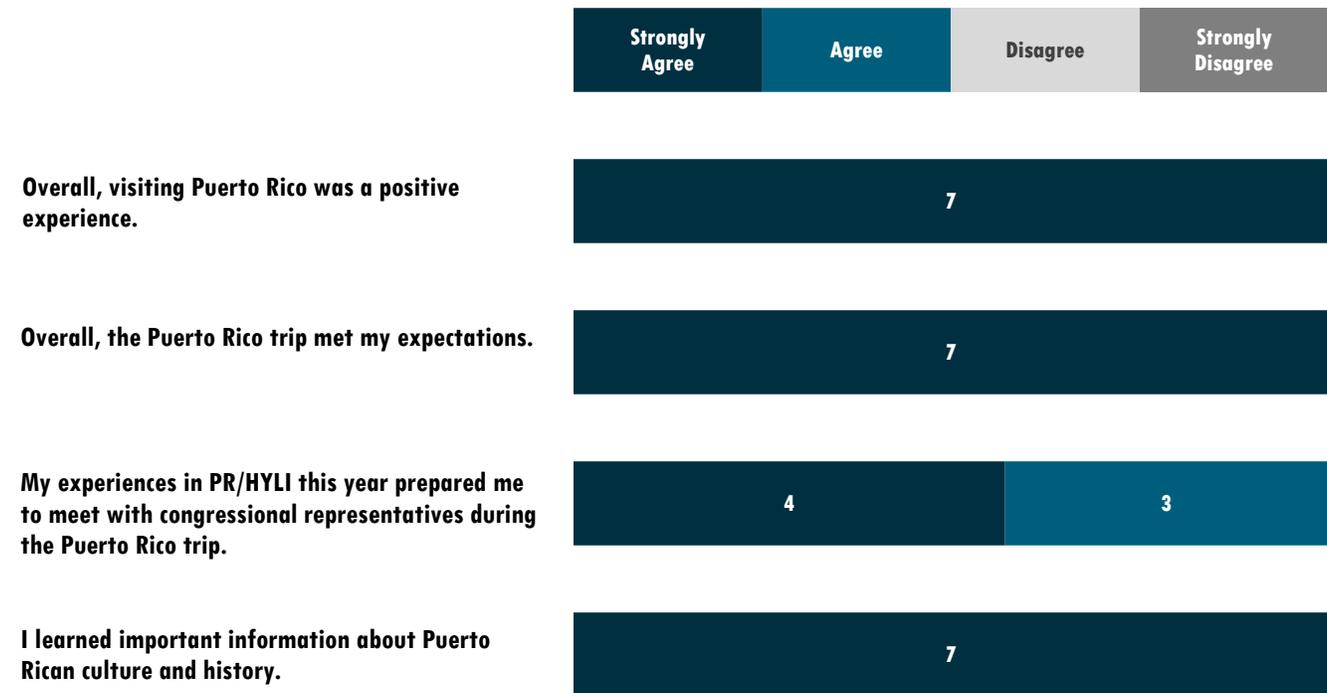

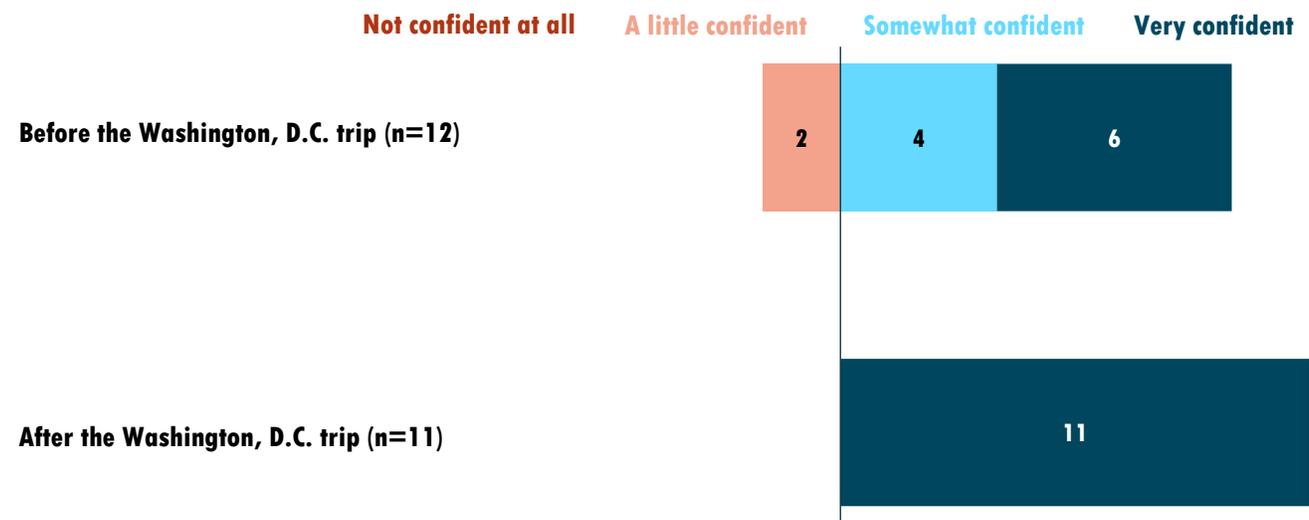

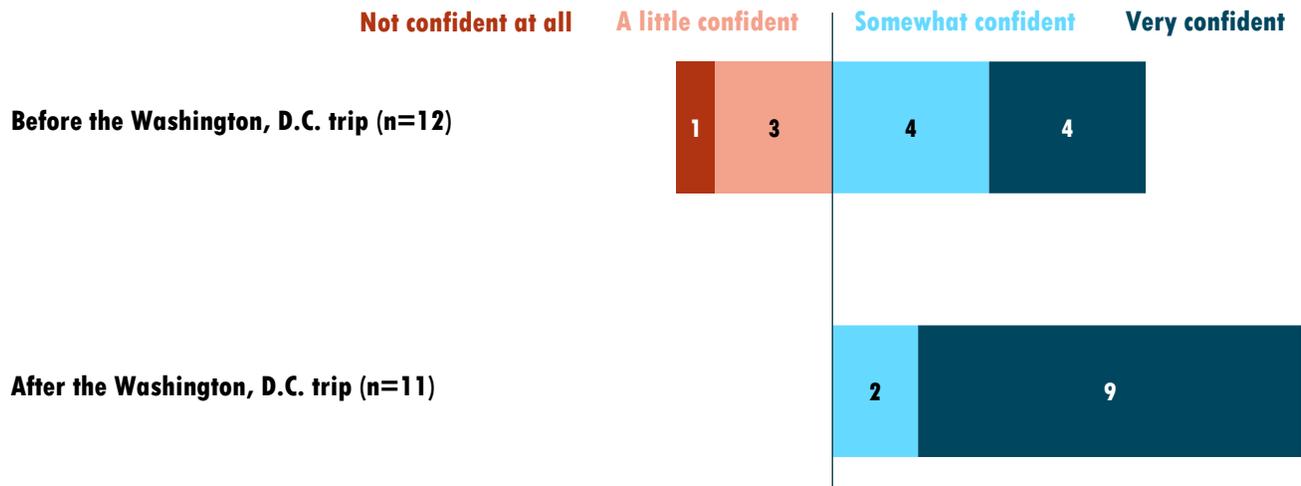

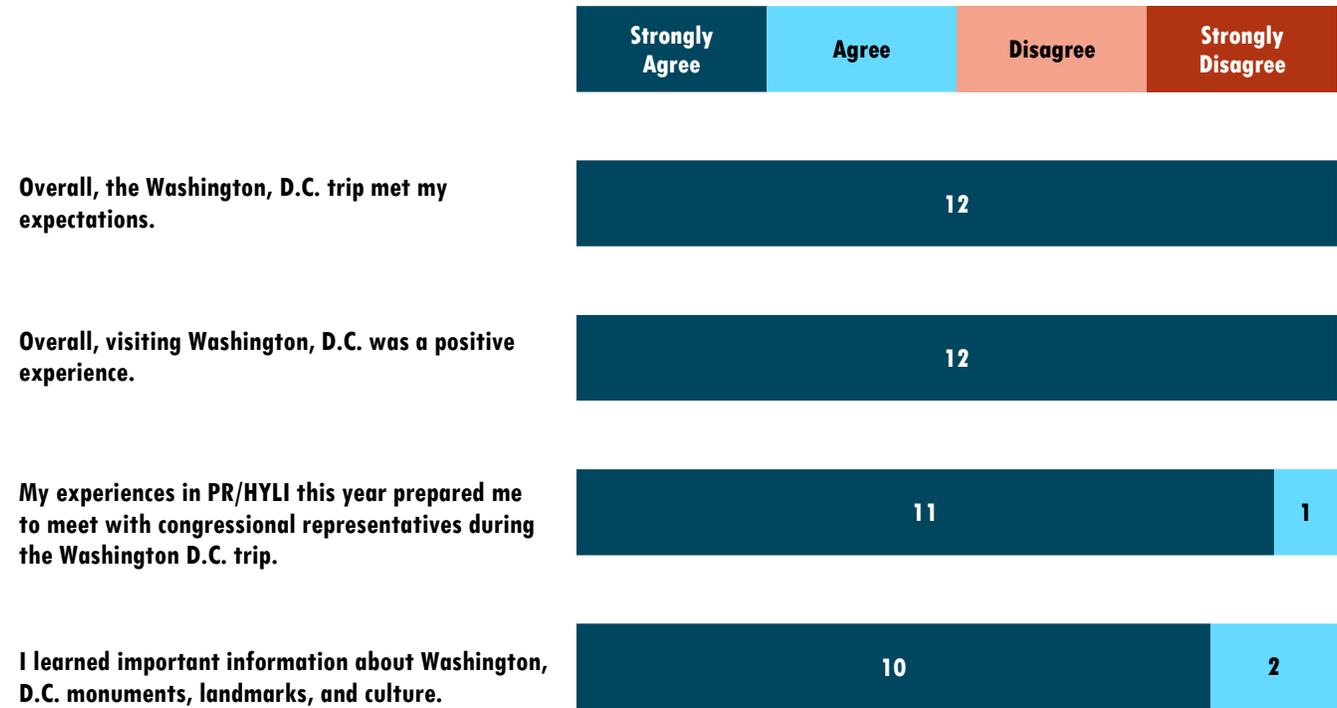

**Describe some of the differences between the federal government and the New York State government.**

- A lot of chaos due to divided legislature.
- Federal Government manages all 50 states and has more separate branches & departments. The NYS government manages counties in NYS.
- Federal: Greater authority + so much staff. State: Less authority + close-knit engagement
- I think a major difference is that issues and problems being debated and discussed are no longer just affecting local laws but the entirety of a country
- One is that the state government and its policies affect you daily and you can see how it is affecting you.

- Some differences include that the State government deals with "state" area issues, while the federal government deals with issues that are national like foreign policy and immigration
- The Federal gov. has a huge variation in views compared to NYS, as we know b/c of NYC is mostly Democrat. Federally there are more outdated but important practices too.
- The federal government does more funding for states than choosing what programs to make within states bc no one knows what their community needs better than the state government. One similarity is that state government and federal government representatives need people who specialize in areas because they cover a mile wide but only an inch deep
- The Federal Government does things like bill and more [important decisions] for the whole country. The government of New York just manages only in the states according to the roles the federal government gives.
- The federal government doesn't oversee local laws and is in charge of working with the president.
- Their inner workings are far more intense (capitol/federal) compared to state government. A bill was passed here that affected the nation, when state passes it affects its area only.
- Though both the federal and state governments work together, federal government worries about foreign affairs, something that doesn't impact state gov's. as much. State governments can focus on issues that are much more local and personal to constituents.

- Always do research and know both sides before making an opinion.
- Government is far more than representatives its also the lobbyist which this city is crawling with. Lobbyists were presented neutrally or even good at times without critically examining their work.
- Lessons about how we can encourage our officials to help fight for us.
- Make sure to do research on both current events and the representatives they will be meeting with
- One very important thing is that even though some people agree with most of your opinions, they may have their differences.
- Pay attention to what people are saying and keep your eyes open (there's always something going on here!)
- That it's best to think logically about opposing opinions/ideas, and to understand where they're coming from. It will strengthen your debate skills.
- That there are many ways to make your dream come truth
- The stories of many whom represent us in Congress and their struggles.
- You do not need to do something enormous to make a change, focusing on your community is what matters.

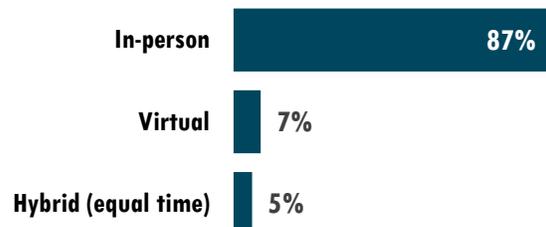

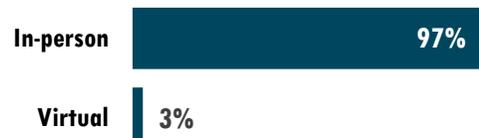

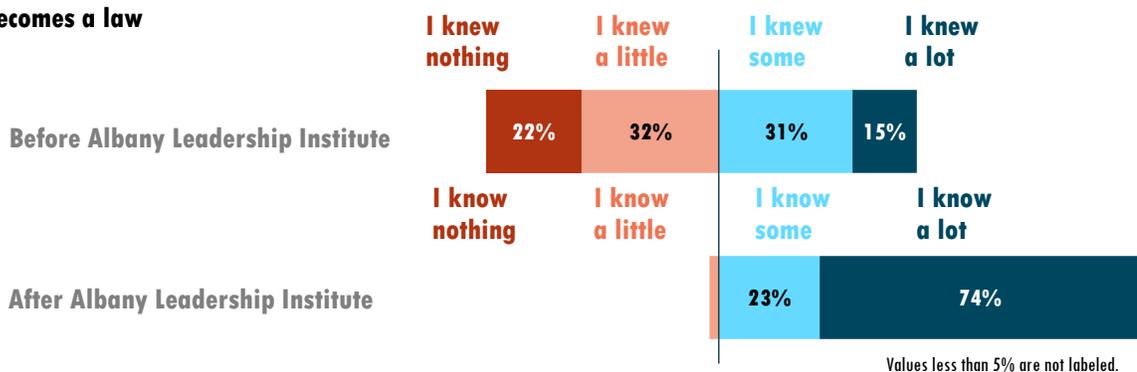


**Growth of Participant Knowledge and Legislative Understanding**

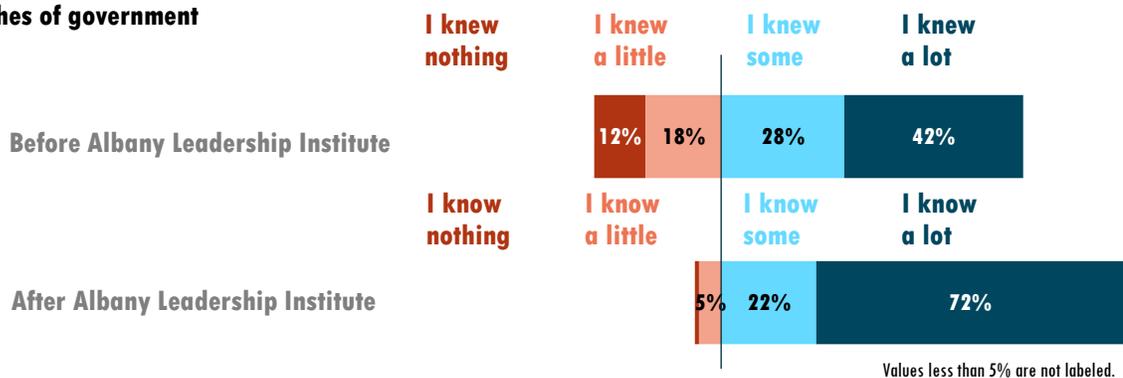

**How much do you know about the following topics BEFORE and AFTER participating in the Leadership Institute?**

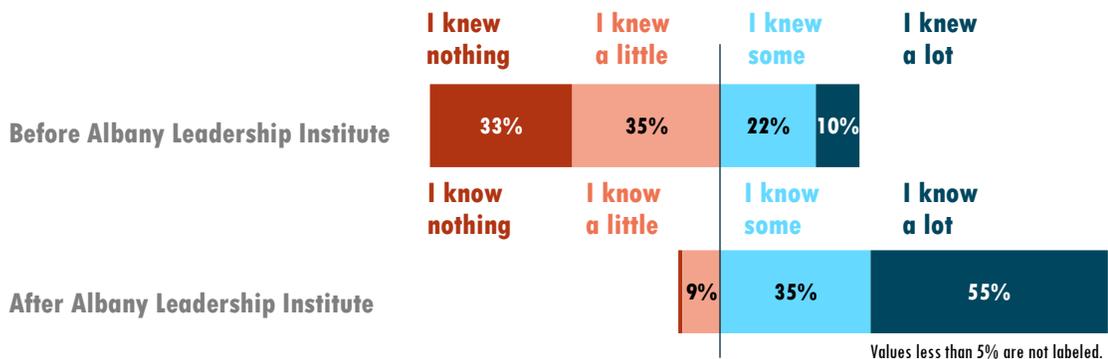

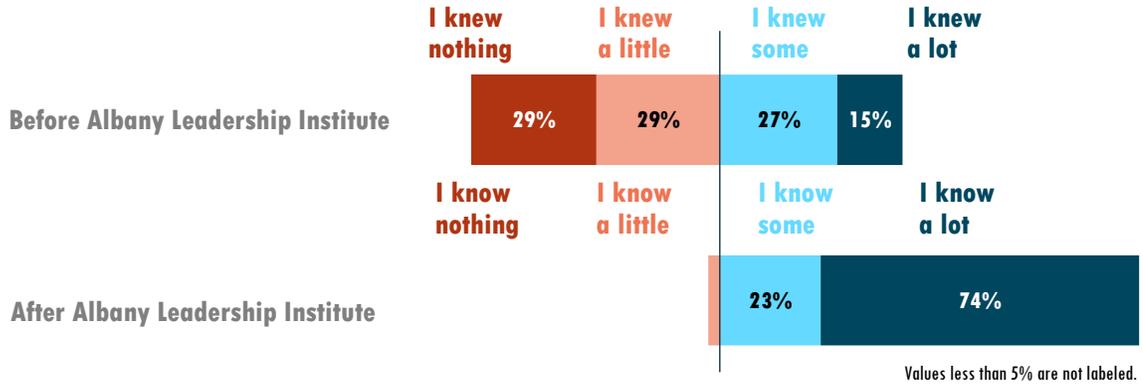

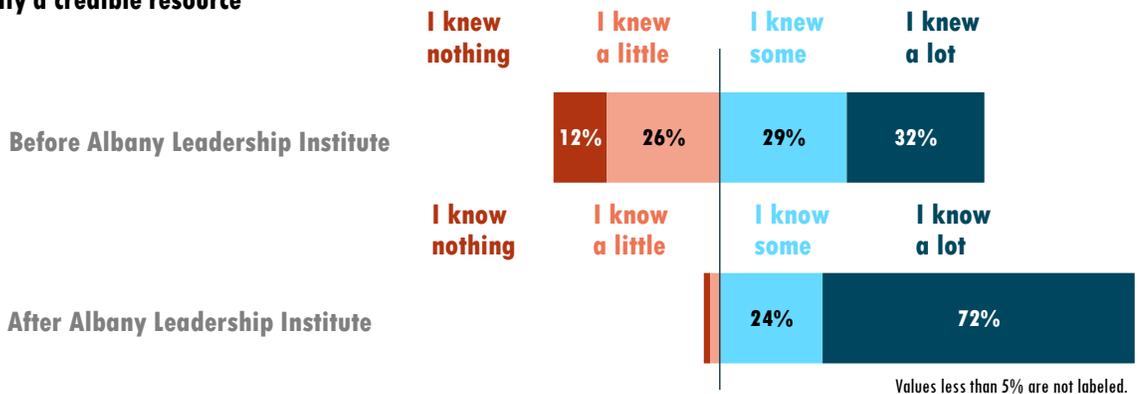

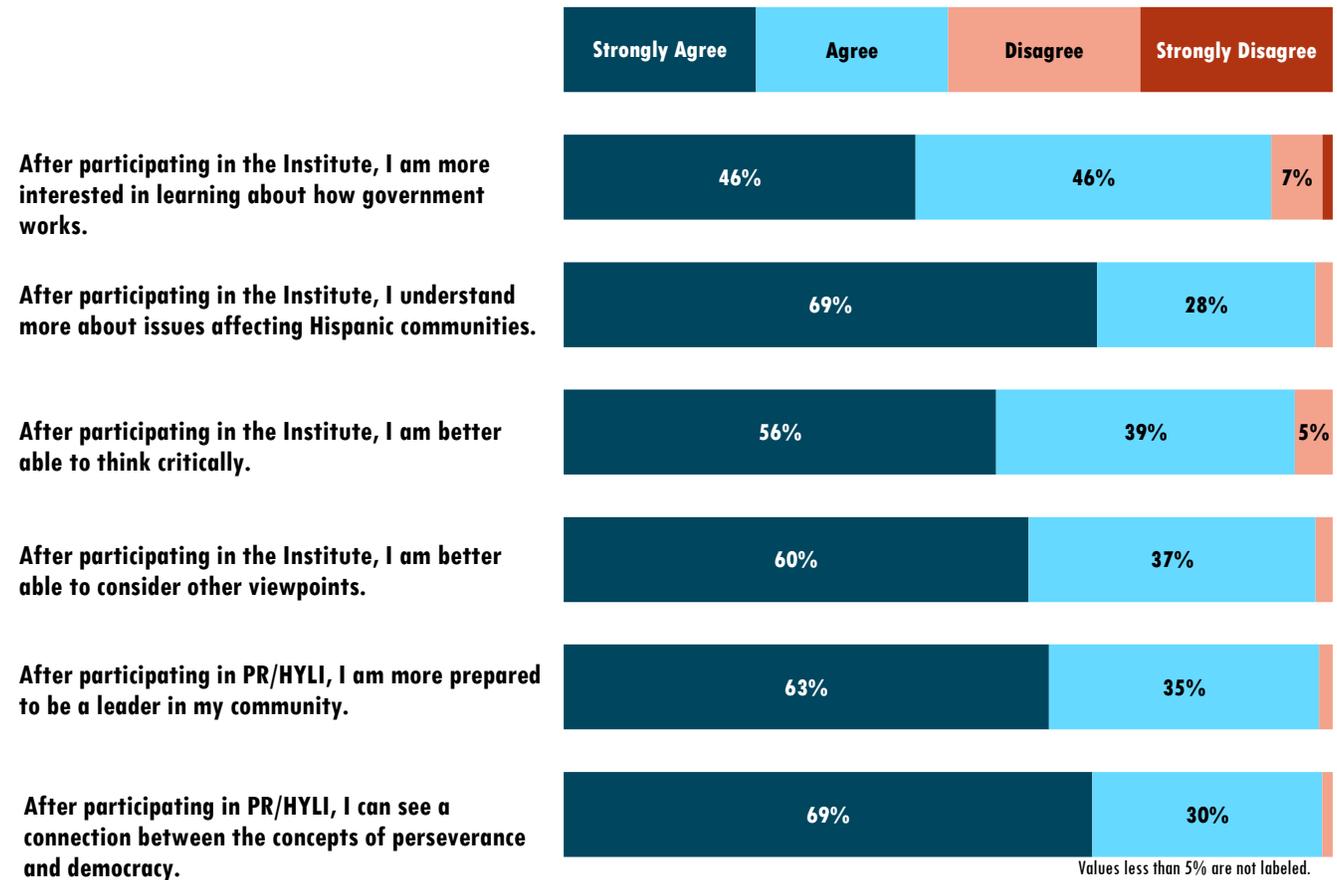

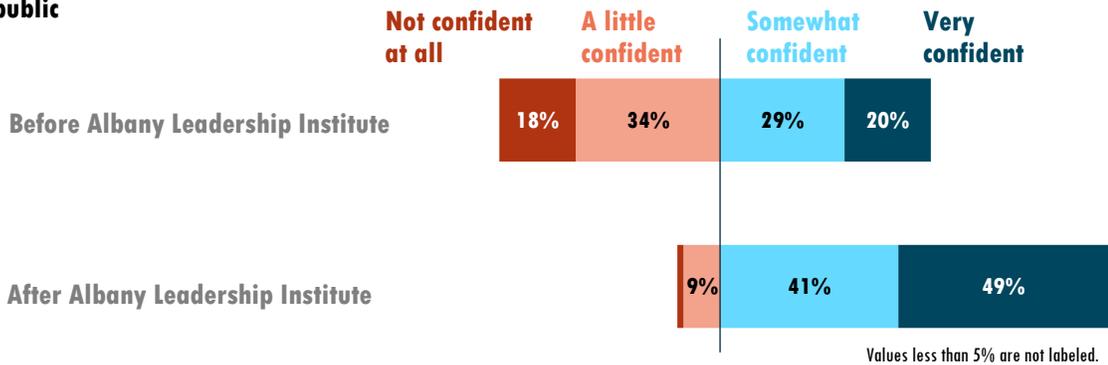

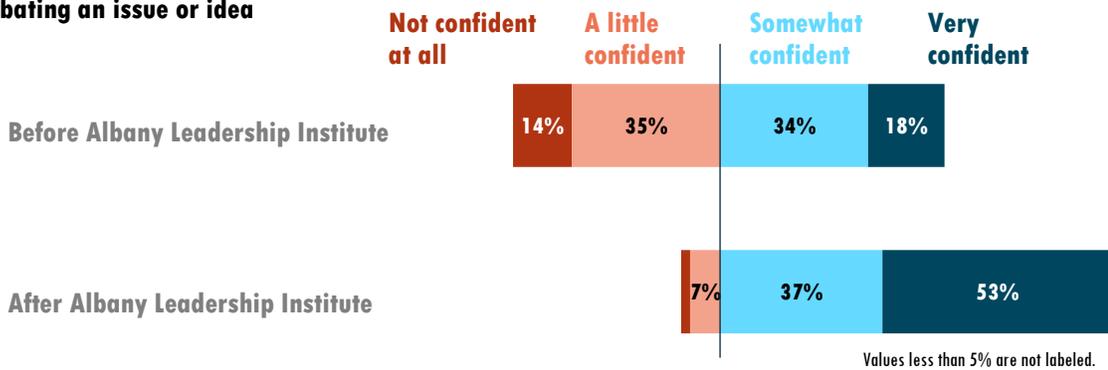

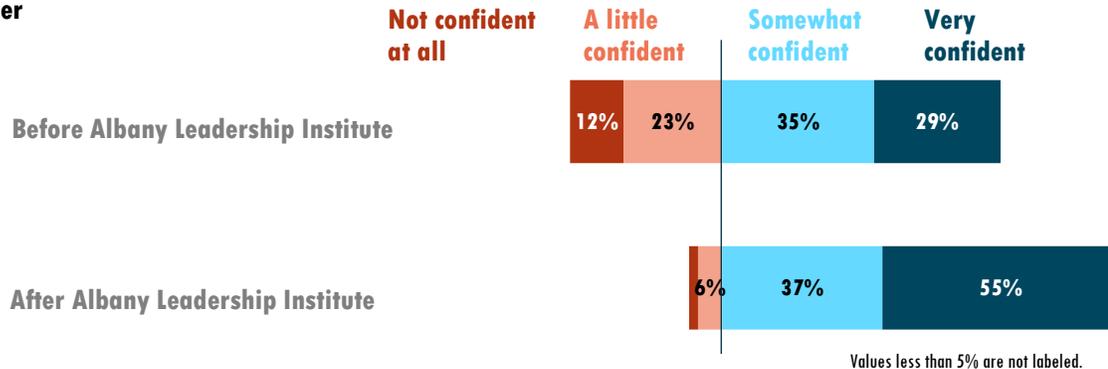

Students debated three different bills during the Legislative Mock Assembly and were asked to rank them from most to least in the following categories. The figure shows the percentage of students who gave each bill the highest ranking in each category. Many students did not rank the bills in comparison to each other but in their own right, and sometimes ranked all in a tie.

Most students selected **Bill #2** as being the most important to them, having the most relevance to their community, and with the highest quality of student debate. When students were given the opportunity to share which bill was the most personally impactful to them, over half (62%) of respondents selected **Bill #2**.

Paid compensation is most important especially in times where they are trying to suppress languages other than English.

Seeing how many people I've helped in Spanish at my job showed me the importance of

Bill #2 because I live in an extremely diverse community of latinos who are afraid to demand better pay for extra skills.

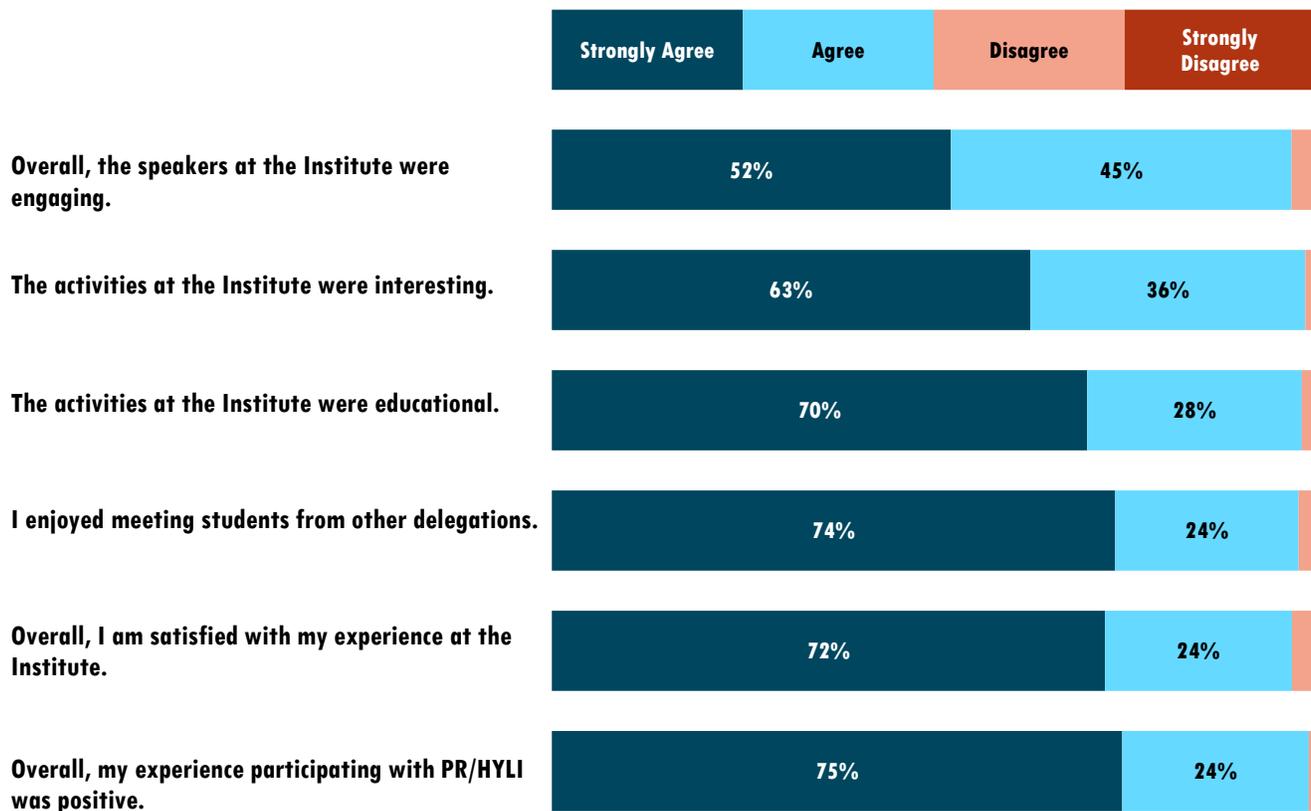
This affects me personally, as I work in a store that often receives customers who only speak Spanish and many of us workers have to translate.
